In addition to his academic work, he is a long-time peace and justice activist, serving on the boards of Peace Action and the Michigan Coalition for Human Rights. (Winter, Fall)

Stephen Steinhardt JD has been an attorney for almost twenty years, conducting over one hundred jury trials. He serves as Adjunct Professor at Wayne State University Law School as well as an adjunct in history at Macomb Community College. On the faculty of both the Oakland and Macomb SOAR programs, he co-produced last year's popular mock trial of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. (Winter, Spring, Fall)
